While enrolled in the Pre-CJ Program, students must complete CJ 202 and CJ 208. Students may also take either or both CJ 205 and CJ 206.

Applications for admission to the Criminal Justice major will be reviewed by an Admissions Committee composed of the Director of Criminal Justice Studies and two members of the full-time criminal justice faculty. Admission to this program will be highly competitive and students should not assume that meeting the minimum criteria to apply for admission will guarantee their acceptance into the program. Among the factors considered will be:

- ❖ Overall GPA at SIUE
- ❖ GPA in Pre-CJ Program
- ❖ Current or previous employment in the criminal justice field
- ❖ Previous course work in criminal justice at other institutions
- ❖ Letters of recommendation from past or present instructors
- ❖ Other considerations that support the University's Long-Term Goal of Engaged Students and Capable Graduates

Declaring a Criminal Justice Major: To declare a major in Criminal Justice, it is necessary to have:

1. Completed all Academic Development courses required by the University;
2. Completed any required courses to address high school deficiencies;
3. Completed all General Education Skills courses with a grade of C or better in all courses;
4. Completed 15 hours of General Education Introductory courses with a grade of C or better in all courses;
5. Completed SOC 111, POLS 112 and CJ/SOC 201 or their equivalents with a grade of C or better in each course;
6. A cumulative grade point average of 2.75 or higher;
7. Completed the Pre-CJ Program (CJ 202, CJ 208, and one other 200-level CJ course, besides 201); and
8. Written permission from the Director of the Criminal Justice Studies Program.
