+ It is preferable to complete CI 440 *prior* to student teaching; however, if necessary, it is possible to take CI 440 during the semester in which student teaching is done.

If students have one or more years of French in high school, they should contact the Department of Foreign Languages to take proficiency tests for appropriate lower-level course work such as FR 101, 102, 201, and 202. FR 101 and 102 do not count toward major requirements, but may be counted as General Education Option B requirements.

Options for a double major, double minor or a single minor are available to French majors. At least one minor is highly recommended and a double major is strongly encouraged. Students considering a double major should decide on a second major as soon as possible.

Declaring a French Major: To declare a major in French, it is necessary to have:

1. Completed all Academic Development courses required by the University;
2. Completed any required courses to address high school deficiencies;
3. A cumulative grade point average of 2.0.

In order to be accepted to the teacher certification program, students must:

1. Receive a grade of C or above in ENG 101 and ENG 102;
2. Successfully complete the introductory course CI 200;
3. Complete 43 semester hours of course credit and have a cumulative grade point average of 2.5 or higher (this includes work at other institutions);
4. Pass the ICTS Basic Skills Test; information about this test is available online at www.icts.nesinc.com;
5. Possess a 3.0 grade point average in all French courses, including those completed at other institutions.

Students who declare themselves as teacher candidates beginning fall 2005 must demonstrate Advanced-Low oral proficiency (ACTFL scale) in order to meet requirements for student teaching. In order to demonstrate Advanced-Low oral proficiency, teacher candidates obtain Advanced Level Check certification.

Teacher candidates who declared prior to fall 2005, must complete an interview with The Teacher Advisory Committee of the Foreign Language Department in order to be accepted for student teaching. Applications are due the first week of the semester prior to the semester in which the candidates plan to student teach.
