Course Description:

This course offers an examination of Native American sovereignty from the perspectives of Political Science and Anthropology. We will cover the history and unique position of American Indian Nations in relation to American political systems, as well as the political dynamics within these indigenous nations as independent entities. The Political Science perspective will focus on understanding the legal and political context of Indian-White relations, while the Anthropology perspective will attempt to penetrate the variety of Native American perspectives on these relations.

Learning Objectives:

- 1. Understand the history and challenges of Native Americans and Native American Nations in the American political system.
- 2. Develop a critical comprehension of Native American sovereignty as an aspect of political, economic, and cultural life.
- 3. To become familiar with ethnohistory, historical archaeology and cultural anthropology approaches to the study of American Indian sovereignty.
- 4. To become familiar with a wide variety of case studies which show the differences and similarities among tribal nations, as well as their political and economic relations within American society.
- 5. Develop your ability to seek out, evaluate, and communicate information generally; specifically to apply this to the experiences of Native American politics and culture.

#1. TEXTBOOK HOMEWORK:

Each quiz will consist of 5 MC questions based on the assigned reading. You may have the reading in front of you when you complete the quiz, but it is *highly recommended* that you do not attempt any of the quizzes without doing the reading in advance. While completing the quizzes, it is advisable to SAVE each question before going on to the next, as well as save the entire test before submitting it. This reduces the chance of technical problems that prevent your test from being recorded. Do NOT use the Blackboard phone app to complete quizzes, since there have been numerous errors reported for them. After you have completed the test, but before you submit it, it is *highly recommended* that you print it and/or save it to a local or flash drive. You must click SUBMIT in order to for Blackboard to record your submission.

#2 and #3. WRITTEN ASSIGNMENTS A AND B

Detailed instructions for these assignments will be circulated and posted on Blackboard in a separate document.

#4. PARTICIPATION:

Attendance will be tracked via sign-up sheets. Absences may be excused with a doctor's note. Each student is allowed one unexcused absence without penalty. Each additional unexcused absence will result in the deduction of a full point from your attendance grade.

Participation will also include active engagement with the Classroom Exercises. Written worksheets will be evaluated on a scale of Complete, Partially Complete or Incomplete. Other measures may also be used to measure engagement in these exercises.

#5. THREE TERM TESTS:

NOTE: You will need three $8\frac{1}{2}$ by 11 inch bubble sheets (the blue ones) to write the tests and exam in this course. These are available at the Bookstore in the Student Center.

The term tests will each consist of 30 multiple choice questions @ 2.5 points each. The questions will be drawn from the Textbook Homework questions, classroom exercises, video worksheets, notes on the chalkboard and lectures. Instructors may take photographs of the chalkboard after every class, so be sure to copy everything on the board into your notes.

Term tests will be written in the classroom during the regular class period. Be prepared to leave your personal gear at the front of the classroom during tests. This includes knapsacks and large purses. You may carry small purses or pouches to your seats. You may also carry your cell phones, but the ringer must be off and it must be kept in your pocket or purse.

#6. FINAL EXAM:

The final exam will consist of 30 multiple choice questions @ 2.5 points each. 20 of these questions will be new material from Part 4 of the course. 10 of these questions will be drawn from the tests for Parts 1, 2 and 3, which will be available on Blackboard as self-study quizzes. The exam is also written in the classroom, and the same rules apply.
