# Students as Digital Historians: Connecting Our Past to Our Future

**Project overview**: Students will complete personal interviews that capture the experiences of veterans and their community using digital storytelling and inquiry-based learning. Stories are digitally preserved and submitted to the U.S. Library of Congress's Veterans History Project at <a href="http://www.loc.gov/vets/">http://www.loc.gov/vets/</a>. Students create a video documentary utilizing primary sources from various websites, including the Library of Congress.

## Prepare for the interview

- Find a local veteran and have him / her complete the Biographical Data Form
   http://www.loc.gov/vets/pdf/biodata-fieldkit-2013.pdf
   . Having this information will help students prepare for the upcoming interview. The local VFW, American Legion, or retirement communities are good places to find veterans.
- 2. Students research veteran's war

#### 5. Conduct the Interview

Tips for conducting Oral History Interviews

- 1. Find a guiet place with a simple background
- 2. Setup camera next to the interviewer. Assign one student to monitor the camera and sound, another to ask the questions. The person asking the questions should be sitting close to the camera and making eye contact with the veteran. Students not asking questions should be taking notes
- 3. Avoid asking questions that can be answered with "yes," or "no." Strive for open ended questions.
- 4. Note be sure to pause and wait between questions / answers
- 5. Interview must be a minimum of 30 minutes
- 6. Fill out audio video logging sheet from the Library of Congress after the interview <a href="http://www.loc.gov/vets/pdf/audioviideo-fieldkit-2013.pdf">http://www.loc.gov/vets/pdf/audioviideo-fieldkit-2013.pdf</a>
- 7. Complete all forms and submit un-edited interview to the Veterans History Project at the Library of Congress to be archived nationally <a href="http://www.loc.gov/vets/kitmenu.html">http://www.loc.gov/vets/kitmenu.html</a>
- 8. Scan veteran's photographs and take digital photos of artifacts and memorabilia

## Produce a documentary

- 1. Use video editing software such as Windows Movie Maker or iMovie to add text, music, and primary sources.
- 2. Research the Library of Congress to find primary source photographs, maps, and music to add to the documentary.
- 3. Add scanned veteran's images, digital photographs
- 4. Go over the *Veteran's Reflection Paper Assignment* document and have students record a reflection to add at the end of video.
