**Course Objective:** This course is an introduction to the regions of the world from a geographic perspective. The concept of regions is used to simplify the complexity of the world's places. This course seeks to enhance your mental map of the world. Major areas of the world will be examined in terms of issues that are currently shaping and changing these places. These issues include cultural diversity and conflict, urbanization, environmental change, resource availability, development, population growth, and the preservation of political independence and new territorial organizations. Students who successfully complete this course will be able to (1) think geographically; (2) identify important locations; and, (3) explain the distinct characteristics of the world's regions.

 $\overline{\text{Exams}}$  will be a combination of multiple choice, definitions, and short answer questions based on lecture material and on assigned readings. Please note: you must bring a scantron (standard, 8.5 x 11) and a #2 pencil to class on exam days.

Make-up exams will only be granted if you (1) contact me within 24 hours of missing the exam, and (2) have a valid, University-sanctioned excuse. Make-up exams are essay format.

For students who have difficulty with multiple-choice type tests, an alternative, essay-style test is available. A sample essay exam will be shown in class, and you are welcome to see me to discuss this option further.

<u>Map Exercises</u>: Since this course considers the places of the world, it is important that you have an understanding of where physical, political, and cultural features are located. To that end, you will complete map exercises for the 12 regions studied. The exercises are comprised of a series of questions that you will answer by reading and comparing maps from your textbook. Map exercises, directions for completing map exercises, and due dates are posted to the course website.

<u>Wiki Project</u>: A semester long project that results in a compilation of web-based information on a particular country will be completed for this class. It comprises 15 percent of your final grade. A handout detailing the project will be provided in class.

<u>In-class exercises</u>: Quizzes and small group work will be used to monitor (1) your understanding of course material, and (2) attendance from time to time. Please note that exercises are worth 10% of your grade – if your final grade is borderline, exercises can affect the final outcome. *You are responsible for all course material regardless of attendance.*
