Special Education at SIUE

The special education program in the Department of Teaching and Learning at SIUE is a nationally recognized program delivered through a collaborative partnership agreement between SIUE and public school districts. Classroom teachers and university professors work together to provide special education candidates a unique opportunity to regularly interact with children with disabilities from Pre-Kindergarten to Age 21. In the School of Education, Health and Human Behavior at SIUE, we provide a combination of classroom instruction and ample opportunities for practical experiences in a variety of settings.

In conjunction with the early childhood program, the special education program also provides courses required for early childhood special education approval. The special education program offers Council for the Accreditation of Educator Preparation-approved programs at the undergraduate level for teaching licensure as a learning behavior specialist (LBS I).

Career Opportunities

Graduates of the undergraduate special education program have a wide range of options for employment. Not only are our graduates licensed in ages Pre-Kindergarten through age 21, but also in a wide range of disabilities. There is a growing need for special educators nationwide, and that growth is anticipated to continue in the years to come. Special education teachers are currently considered a teacher shortage area in Illinois.

Hands-On Learning

Teacher education programs at SIUE regularly involve students in experiential learning. Opportunities for experiential learning take many forms, such as in-class activities and simulations in the Virtual Professional Practice Lab, case studies, school-based projects, and undergraduate research and/or service learning projects. Our programs also make extensive use of field-based partnerships through field trips, practica and student teaching. Teacher education students at SIUE are placed in a variety of diverse field experiences that allow them to interact with children and learn through real-world application.

Clinical Experiences

Candidates progress through a series of developmentally sequenced field experiences for the full range of ages, types and levels of abilities and collaborative opportunities that are appropriate to the learning behavior specialist. These experiences are supervised by qualified professionals. These experiences, which must be completed prior to student teaching, are arranged through the School of Education, Health and Human Behavior Student Services.

Declaration Requirements

High school students with a strong academic record may apply for direct declaration to the Department of Teaching and Learning in the early childhood, elementary or special education programs. Students must have earned at least a 27 ACT or 1210 SAT and at least a 3.75 high school GPA or rank in the top 10 percent of their high school graduating class. Early declaration will guarantee a student admission to the program, contingent upon meeting the state requirements for full admission to the program outlined above.

Transfer students should contact an advisor in the School of Education, Health and Human Behavior Student Services as early as possible to discuss transfer procedures.

Admission Requirements

Admission to a major within the special education program requires satisfactory completion of the pre-special education program described in the section below. A student handbook and application forms for admission to the major are available in the School of Education, Health and Human Behavior Student Services office, located in Founders Hall, Room 1110.

**Faculty**

Faculty in the special education program in the School of Education, Health and Human Behavior represent a diverse group of professional educators and exemplary teachers, holding doctoral degrees from universities throughout the country. Admission Requirements, Cont.

Applications should be completed by March 1 if applying for the fall semester. Admission to the program is competitive and applying to the program does not guarantee admission.

In order to be admitted to a major in special education, students must:

- Be admitted to SIUE
- Have a cumulative grade point average (GPA) of 2.5 or higher from all secondary institutions attended
- Have completed 42 semester hours of coursework
- Obtain a grade of C or higher in each course included in the 15 hours of foundations coursework
- Obtain a grade of B or higher in SPE 100 or an equivalent professional level course
- Maintain good academic standing at SIUE (if applicable)
- Submit an application for admission to the special education program and transcript of all coursework completed
- **Students interested in licensure** must pass a test of basic skills approved by the state of Illinois. Students may use the ACT or SAT to meet this requirement. Please contact the School of Education, Health and Human Behavior Student Services office for more information on using the ACT or SAT score to meet licensure requirements. **You must have a copy of your required test score on file to student teach.**
