RESIDENT CAMP FACT SHEET

- Camp Cedar Point (CCP) has been around for over 60 years!
- Camp Cedar Point is 200 acres located in Crab Orchard
 National Wildlife Refuge on Little Grassy Lake, 20 minutes south of Carbondale
- We are a resident camp that serves 400-500 campers every summer
- There are 6 different units where girls can stay
- A unit consists of either a platform tent or a Hogan (a Hogan is a screened in cabin)
- Each unit has its own theme and the girls staying in the unit will be around the same age
- Each unit will have between 2-4 counselors
- Many of our counselors return to camp every year and they have cool camp names. (mine is Cupquake... ya, I know)
- Our counselors are all First Aid and CPR trained. They also receive a full week of staff training prior to camp
- Every year we hire around 34 staff
- We have a certified Health Supervisor on camp property at all times
- All lifeguards are Certified which includes the American Red Cross Waterfront certification
- The camp is not air conditioned (except for the infirmary)

- CCP is a primitive camp meaning there are really cool insects and animals for us to observe
- Campers ages range from 7-17
- If parents wish to attend camp they will need to fill out a CCP volunteer application. If accepted, they will be stationed in a unit separate from their child. (Please refer volunteers to Anne)
- There is a lot of walking at camp
- There is also a lot of FUN to walk to!
- Activities are scheduled on Sunday nights so that the girls have input
- We never force girls to do any activities they are not comfortable with. (we may encourage them)



Camp Cedar Point consists of 250 acres of scenic woods on Little Grassy Lake located in the Crab Orchard National Wildlife Refuge. CCP offers natural diversity, a sandy beach, hiking trails, and many species of wildlife.

Facilities include two shower houses, an infirmary, a full-service dining hall, a lake, shelters, hogans, platform tents, and lots of great natural space.



General Living Conditions

Campers stay in platform tents or hogans with three or more campers. Tents have wooden floors above the ground and cots with mattresses. Hogans are screened, wooden structures with cots and mattresses. Staff sleep in a separate tents or hogans within the unit. Girls stay in units based on age and program focus. In 1926, the Levis Family commissioned a group of Civilian Conservation Corps (C.C.C.) members to build a YWCA retreat called Camp Talahi. Nearly thirty years later, industrialist and entrepreneur John M. Olin bought the lodge and surrounding woods. Later, Mr. Olin deeded his property to the State, requesting that it always be preserved as a natural area.

Over the years, volunteer stewards, educators, and community members of all kinds have kept Olin's vision alive. The Nature Institute officially became a nonprofit organization in 1980 and, with the help of people like you, we continue to protect the Olin Nature Perserve and other parts of our community's natural heritage.

Restoration







Tips for Hiking

- Wear supportive shoes, especially through the Olin Nature Preserve and the Mississippi Sanctuary where trails become moderately steep.
- Leave No Trace: Whatever you carry in, carry back out. Please no pets, fires, or motorized vehicles on the preserves.
- Let somone know you're going. Even though most TNI trails are light to moderate, there are innate dangers in hiking, such as encountering venomous snakes or uneven terrain.
- Watch out for poison ivy ("leaves of three, let it be").

SUMMER 2014

Writing Day Camp

The thirty-first annual SIUE Summer Writing Day Camp is an attractive opportunity for youths ages 8 to 18 who wish to combine learning with recreation. Presented through the Department of English Language and Literature, the Writing Day Camp offers intensive and practical development in basic writing skills in combination with a full and vigorous recreational program.

Students are grouped according to their grade level in school, with groups averaging about 12 students each. Total enrollment is limited to 78 student-campers per session. The camp director is assisted by a staff comprised of area elementary and secondary school and University teachers and recreational counselors. The adult-student ratio in the Writing Camp is about 1 to 10.

The daily schedule is 9:00-10:30, classroom writing development; 10:30-12:00, campus recreational activity; 12:00-12:30, lunch; 12:30-2:00, classroom writing development; 2:00-3:30, campus recreational activity. All student-campers eat together in the University cafeteria. Campers may purchase their lunch or bring it from home.

Writing Development

The writing sessions of the camp concentrate on intensive practice in the development and expression of ideas. The objective of the program is the development of skill in the articulation of thought in the sentence, the paragraph, and the short essay, as well as, by means of collaborative effort, in such creative forms as drama and fiction. Instruction in spelling, grammar, punctuation, and other basics of language usage is provided on an

individual basis as needed, but not as an objective of the program.

Students at all grade levels use computers extensively in the composition process, but they do not need prior experience with computers in order to do well in the program.

The sole requirement for admission to the Writing Camp is the desire to learn to write well. Enrollment is on a first-come first-served basis.

Cost: \$215.00

A \$15.00 non-refundable enrollment fee is payable with the return of the registration form. The \$200.00 balance is due no later than June 6 for the June session and July 3 for the July session.

Recreational Activity

The beautiful natural setting of its 2,600-acre campus makes Southern Illinois University Edwardsville ideal for a summer recreational program for youths. Student-campers have the opportunity to choose from a wide range of recreational activities that stimulate their imagination and develop their physical skills: softball, swimming, volleyball, bowling, and nature exploration, among others.

Writing instructors and recreational counselors try to insure that student-campers view the writing and recreational parts of the camp as one continuous learning experience.

The SIUE Summer Writing Day Camp is offered by the Department of English Language and Literature in the College of Arts and Sciences. It represents an effort to upgrade literacy through close professional cooperation between the University and area schools on the initiative of the University. Instructors in the Writing Camp either are area elementary and secondary school teachers or are present or former instructors in the Department of English at SIUE who have received special training in the teaching of writing.
