# PBHE 210 - Sexual Health Winter Session 2025 - Syllabus

**Course Description:** This class will survey the dynamics of human sexuality. We will identify and examine basic issues in human sexuality as relating to the larger society. The course situates sexual health in a broader conceptualization of overall health. The format for the course includes videos, podcasts, and additional readings.

What is sexual health? Sexual health is a state of physical, emotional, mental, and social wellbeing in relation to sexuality; it is not merely the absence of disease, dysfunction, or infirmity. Sexual health requires a positive and respectful approach to sexuality and sexual relationships, as well as the possibility of having pleasurable and safe sexual experiences, free of coercion, discrimination, and violence (WAS, 2014).

**Course Objectives:** At the conclusion of the course students will be able to:

- 1. Identify and describe feelings about their own sexuality.
- 2. Apply a new understanding of human sexuality to their own personal life.
- 3. Demonstrate the competency to explore the contribution of a variety of disciplines to our understanding of human sexuality and critique points of view in the literature.
- 4. Apply new understandings of human sexuality that help dispel current myths and misunderstandings.
- 5. Describe the range of sexual beliefs, attitudes and behaviors that exist in a diverse society.
- 6. Identify sexual organs, their functions, potential dysfunctions, and associated treatments.
- 7. Recognize their own value system and show objectivity and self-confidence when making decisions concerning personal and social aspects of sexuality throughout the lifespan.
- 8. Illustrate how people function sexually at different stages of life.
- 9. Explain how to prevent unwanted pregnancy and sexually transmissible infections using various techniques.

#### **Course Culture:**

Students should be aware that the content of this course may be considered by some to be sensitive and controversial. Course content will include a diverse range of sexual attitudes, beliefs, and behaviors. Explicit content is an important part of this course. As such, you must be at least 18 years of age to enroll in this class.

<u>Continued enrollment in this course indicates that you have been informed of the</u> nature of the content and you have made an active decision to participate.

The class is intended to be a **safe space**. All people are welcome regardless of age, ethnicity, race, national origin, gender, sexual orientation, religion, and ability. Hatred or disparaging remarks **will not be tolerated**. You will be asked to meet with the instructor to discuss your remarks and any disciplinary action that may be taken.

#### **Course Policies:**

**Communication:** The best way to contact the instructor is **via e-mail**. I will respond to e-mail within 48 hours, not including weekends and holidays.

Communication Expectations: Emails to me and other professionals should be formally addressed and proofread for errors. Do not make a request and close your email with "Thank you in advance"—it is presumptuous. A better option is "I will be grateful for any help you can provide" or "Thank you for considering my request" or simply, "Sincerely". Emailing is NOT texting—it requires a level of thought and consideration that takes time. Do not send emails when you are angry, upset or in a state where you cannot be professional. Allow at least 48 hours for a response before resending an email for weekdays and holidays, 72 hours.

# **Course Engagement:**

Students are expected to remain always engaged in the course throughout the winter session. This means reading assigned readings and **checking SIUE e-mail and blackboard** <u>everyday</u>.

#### **Technology Requirements:**

Students are expected to have reliable Internet access on a regular basis. It is your responsibility to address any computer problems that might occur. Such problems are not an excuse for delays in meeting expectations or for missing course deadlines. **Assigned Readings:** Students are expected to read the assigned textbook and other readings. Students should expect to be tested or quizzed on assigned readings. The required textbook is available at Textbook Services on campus.

**Blackboard:** All course materials are posted on blackboard in folders under coursework. It is the student's responsibility to regularly check blackboard for announcements. **This is a self-paced class. All course materials are due by January 5<sup>th</sup> at 11:59pm.** Late work will not be accepted. It is the responsibility of the student to complete and submit assignments on time and in the correct format. Follow directions provided.

### **Required Assignments:**

Students are expected to **regularly back up their electronic work** (flash drive, CD, external hard drive etc.). Computer issues are not sufficient grounds for an extension. In addition, students are expected to securely store all returned graded materials.

**All documents must be submitted in MICROSOFT WORD format only.** No other types of files will be accepted. NO PDFS! Incorrect formats will receive a zero.

# Late Assignment Policy: No late work will be accepted. Emailed work is not accepted in this class. Handwritten work is not accepted in this class.

If you receive a grade, you feel is in error, you will have one week from the day the grade or assignment is returned/posted on Blackboard to request reconsideration. All requests must be made in writing, and you must indicate how you feel you met the objectives for the assignment. No changes are possible after one week.

The only situations for which you may make up missed work or exams include illness, deaths, religious observances, and pre-notified, excused athletic events. The instructor will make final approval regarding missed work or exams. Students must contact the instructor <u>in advance</u> and provide required documentation. If you fail to provide documentation or do not obtain approval, you will receive zero points for that assignment or exam.

#### Personal Reflection Assignment - 80 points

Students will write a reflection paper at the end of the course.

#### Writing Assignments (6X20) - 120 points

Students will complete various writing assignments.

#### Online Tests - 200 points

There will be five online, non-cumulative tests covering course material. The questions will be based on textbook readings and any other materials. Tests will consist mainly of multiple-choice, true/false. All exams are timed and one attempt only.

- 4. Madison County AIDS Program provides free anonymous and confidential HIV testing using no needles. They also have free condoms, lube, dental dams and more. Call 618-877-5110.
