Course Description:

US History to 1877 (HIST 200) is a general survey of the history of the United States from the Colonial Era to the end of Reconstruction. HIST 200 is also a lab course, which introduces students to analyzing historical primary sources and drawing logical conclusion about US history based on these documents and their knowledge of the historical record.

By the end of this course students will be able to:

- 1. Apply their knowledge of the history of the United States to the understanding and interpretation of primary source documents from the past.
- 2. Apply their knowledge of the history of the United States to 1877 and their discoveries generated through the analysis of primary sources and lectures/textbook to a midterm and final exam.

Analyzing Sources: 20 points each x 12=240 points

Assignments:

Analyzing Sources: Analyzing Sources assignments include all "Analyzing Sources" boxes in the assigned module (generally two-to-four boxes per module). You must answer the questions in each of these boxes to receive full credit for the assignment (20 points). These are graded as all-or-nothing, so that if you answer all the assigned questions completely and accurately, you will receive full credit. If you answer any of the questions partially or inaccurately, you will receive no credit. If you turn in a complete set of responses late, you will receive half credit.

Please note: To answer the questions in an "Analyzing Sources" box **completely and accurately**, you will need to read the historical material preceding it as well. All of the material needed to answer each "Analyzing Sources" question **completely and accurately** can be found in the module assigned, or in earlier assigned modules.

All "Analyzing Sources" questions should be answered in a Word file and uploaded to Blackboard in the proper assignment category. **Please include the questions with your responses.**

Lab Reports: Lab Reports are written individually. Each lab report is worth 60 points and will be scored according to the rubric at the end of this syllabus. Most of your Lab Reports are "Document-Based Questions," which require you to incorporate primary sources into your response. Instructions as to how to write Document-Based Questions are included sequentially in your textbook, starting in Period 2.

All Lab Reports should be answered in a word File and uploaded to Blackboard in the proper assignment category. Please include the Document-Based Question at the top of your response. You do not have to include documents in your Word file but please cite the documents in your essay with a parenthetical citation at the end of the appropriate sentence. Like this:

James K. Polk hid his desire for war when he said, "The Mexican government...after a long-continued series of menaces, have at last invaded our territory...." (Document 1).

Midterm/Final Exam: There are two exams in this course. Both exams will be taken online. On each exam, you will answer one essay question and one Document-Based Question. You can find each exam in Blackboard and begin preparing for them immediately.

All exams responses will be entered online. Please use the citation method described above for your DBQs on your exams.

Optional Assignments: Unless otherwise indicated in this syllabus, the "Thinking Historically," "Writing Historically," and "Analyzing Sources" exercises in the textbook are *optional*. However, they will all help you with completing the assignments and assessments above.

If you use the exact words of another author, you must place these words in quotation marks.
