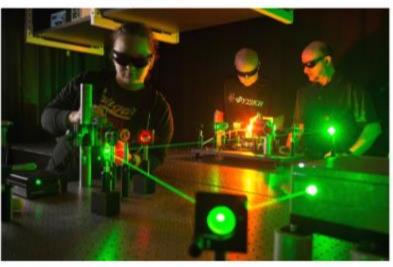

Student Adjustments

Homesickness	Get involved/be active, routine, connections, comforts, talk it out.
Time Management	Use a planner, set priorities, get organized, schedule appropriately, stop procrastinating.
Study Skills	Prepare for and participate in class, follow up, set a schedule, ask for help, stay focused.
Academic Expectations	Responsible, organized, engage with faculty and peers.
Financial Issues	Budget or financial plan, revenues, expenses
Stress Management	Be active, self-care, get enough sleep, seek support.

- Reach out directly to University personnel when you need to intercede.

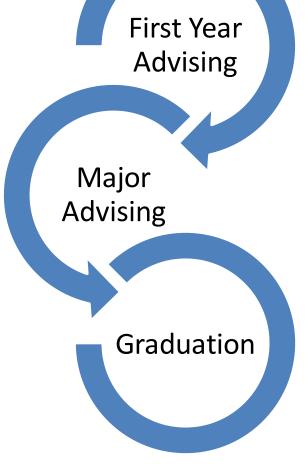
Academic Advising at SIUE

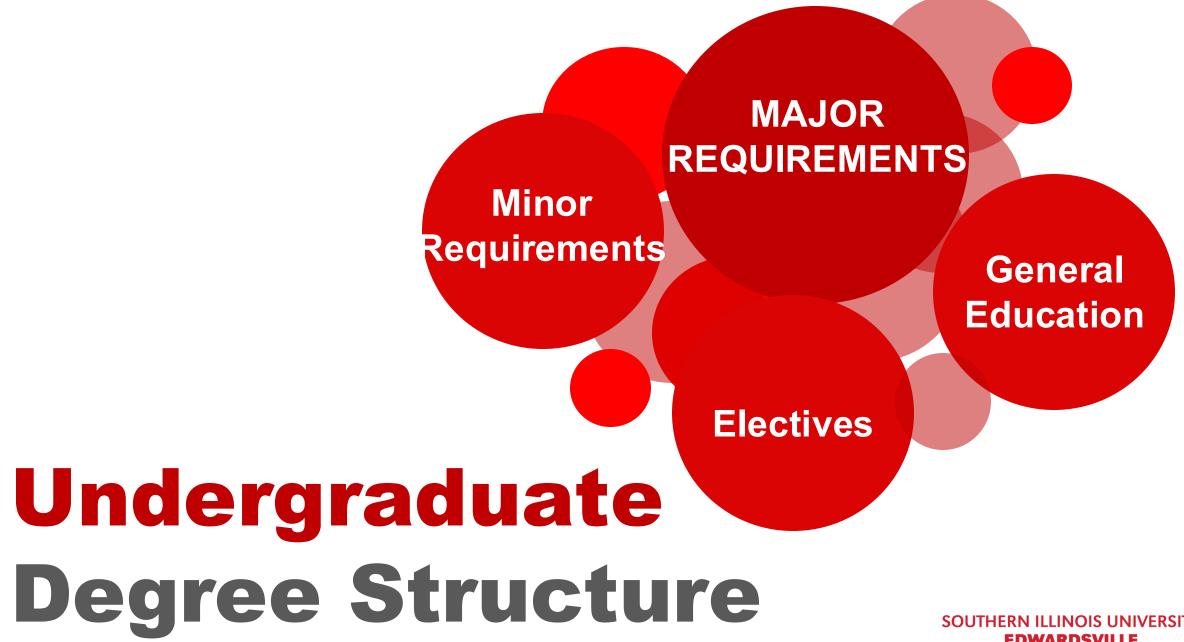
Advising is required at SIUE!

First-year students are supported by advising offices: First-year and Transitional Advising, SOAR, Athletics, and Honors.

First-year students: meet with your advisor at least three times per semester

Academic Advisors are partners on your academic journey.

Students who take 15 credit hours per semester or 30 credit hours per year stay on track to graduate in 4 years.

What should my fall schedule look like?

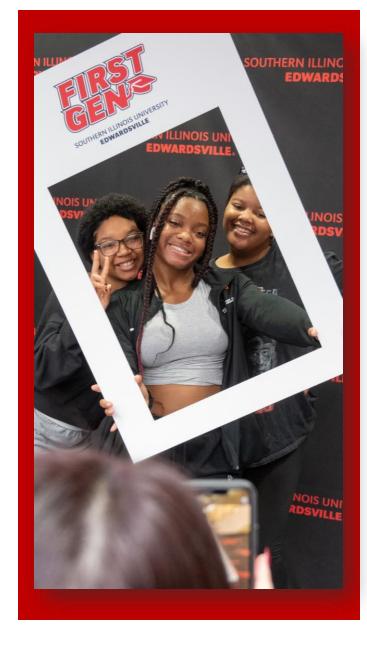
- General education course(s)

Student Preparation

Use a planner	Put upcoming plans and schedules in a planner.
Check email	Check email twice a day to develop good habits.
Develop sleep schedule	You will know your academic schedule. Plan to develop a sleeping schedule so it is less difficult to transition.
Don't forget academics	Work on something academic so you don't get rusty.
Evaluate your career goals	If you are unsure of your major or want to confirm your decision, you can use the Career Development website to explore career outcomes.
Begin the pathway to SIUE	Be ready to make new friends and develop new networks at SIUE. Identify ways to stay in touch with family and longstanding friends. Don't expect to continue status quo.
