College Tours

Our number one goal at UBMS is to get our students ready for college! Not only is it important to make sure that our students are ready and can compete academically, it is also important that student's get exposure to the variety of colleges and universities that are out there. This is why college tours will also be a primary focus throughout the UBMS experience.

Through exposure to the different colleges, students have a chance to experience characteristics they like and do not like about schools. Also, they gain experience asking the questions that will be important to ask when it comes time to choose a school of their own. They will also learn how different schools specialize or emphasize certain disciplines such as a school of engineering or the school of liberal arts. They can also see what schools can offer such as student housing, resources, financial aid and facilities.



That is why we kicked off the program by visiting 5 colleges/ universities this summer! Our first College experience was with SIUE while staying on campus. Student's had their first experience speaking with admission counselors and touring the campus. Student's also had an opportunity to speak with the Career Development Center and listened to a presentation on Developing their professional image.

During our Atlanta Trip we visited Georgia Tech, Georgia State University, Spelman College and Morehouse College (along with other honorable mentions as we drove by on a guided bus tour, i.e. Emory University and Morris Brown College). Students got experience the difference between Georgia Tech located on the outskirts of Atlanta isolated viruses the urban setting of Georgia State located in the middle of Atlanta.
