Course Description & Objectives: This course is a survey of the major sub-disciplines within human geography. Students who successfully complete this course will be able to (1) describe the nature and characteristics of geography, specifically human geography; (2) apply geographic models and concepts to everyday situations; and, (3) identify, describe, and explain spatial patterns and relationships particular to human geography.

Course Mechanics: Your final grade is a weighted average. It will be comprised of the following components:

Three exams (non-cumulative) 60%

Journal

Individual Entries 22.5%
Comprehensive Entry 7.5%
Exercises 10%

Exams will be a combination of multiple choice, definition, & short answer questions based primarily on lecture material, but also on assigned readings. A review sheet and practice questions will be posted to the course website about one week prior to the exam date. Please note: you must bring a scantron (standard, 8.5×11) and a #2 pencil to class on exam days.

For students who have difficulty with multiple choice tests, an alternative, essay-style test is available. Please see me if you would like to discuss this option.

Make-up exams will only be granted if you (1) contact me within 24 hours of missing the exam, and (2) have a valid, University-sanctioned excuse. Exams taken on any day other than the scheduled exam day will be essay format.

<u>Journal</u>: It is important for you to have the opportunity to demonstrate your understanding of course content. To that end, you will read a series of newspaper articles over the course of the semester, and consider how these articles relate to course content. Journal articles are available via Blackboard (http://bb.siue.edu).

- <u>Six individual journal entries</u> comprise 22.5% of your final grade;
- <u>A comprehensive entry</u>, which requires you to reflect on all of the journal entries that you completed, comprises 7.5% of your final grade.

Directions, including due dates, and a grading rubric, are available on the course website. There is choice in this assignment in terms of which individual journals you complete. Please make note of the due dates as late assignments will not be accepted.

<u>Exercises</u>: Quizzes and small group work will be used to monitor (1) your understanding of course material, and (2) attendance from time to time. Exercises cannot be made up. Please note that exercises are worth 10 percent of your final grade - if your final grade is borderline, exercises can affect the final outcome. You are responsible for all course material regardless of attendance.

Syllabus & journal quiz (Due: 9/1/11 by 5 pm): An optional syllabus & journal quiz is available in Blackboard. This quiz will help you become familiar with the information in these two documents (and that familiarity will help you be successful in this course). If you submit the syllabus quiz on time and earn a perfect score, it will replace one of your six individual journal entries with a score of 100 (in other words, you will complete 5 journal entries, and a 100 will be entered for your sixth individual journal entry). This quiz is optional, but I strongly encourage you to take the time to complete it. Please note that you will complete and submit the quiz in Blackboard.

Final grades: Final grades are as follows: A = 90.0% and above; B = 80-89.9%; C = 70-79.9%; D = 60-69.9%, and, F = 59.9% and below.

Attendance: Regular attendance is expected, and will be taken from time to time. You are responsible for all course material regardless of attendance.

First Day Attendance Policy: Students who are not in attendance on the first day of class will be dropped from class at the instructor's discretion.

Class notes: Lectures are done in PowerPoint and the slides will be available on the course website. These notes are an outline of what is discussed in class. If you want to be successful in this course, then you must take notes in class in addition to these PowerPoint slides. *Printing out the notes alone is not enough*.

Class Courtesy: It is important for each person enrolled in this course to be treated with, and to treat others, with respect and courtesy. To that end:

- 1. come to class on time and stay the entire time;
- 2. turn your cell phone off and put it away (it should not be on your desk, in your lap) no ringing and no text messaging;
- 3. come to class prepared to listen & participate (i.e. do not do other work while in class);
- 4. listen to each other's comments and opinions with an open mind; and,
