Big Brothers Big Sisters of Southwestern Illinois was founded in 1980 by a group of social workers who want to dedicate their time to the children in the special education of belleville and the children of the St. Clair County.

By 2003, the agency had expanded to Clinton, Madison and Monroe County. A goal for this chapter was to match up 1,100 volunteers with children by 2010.

To become a volunteer for Big Brothers Big Sisters is a great opportunity not only for the volunteers but also for the child that he/she will be matched up with. Maybe you never got the chance to be a big brother or sister, well now is your time!

Volunteering

Once you have gone through the interview process, the final step is being matched up with your Little. Building this relationship with your Little is like no other experiend. It is up to the volunteer to make the best out of this special bond.

In a year, volunteers have the chance to make an impact on these children that could change the rest of their lives.

Children enrolled are more likely to:

- Graduate high school
- Make positive life choices
- Maintain a better relationship with friends and families
- Not get involved in gangs or drugs



Enrolling a child

Children who are enrolled into the Big Brothers Big Sisters program are referred

to as Littles. Things to follow when enrolling a Little:Little Sisters are between the ages of 6-14; Little Brothers are between the ages of 7-14. Families who enroll their child have done so on a voluntary basis.Littles and their families must be capable of supporting a relationship with a mentor.



Requirements for volunteers

- 18 years of age and over
- Have ameans of transportation, upto-date insurance, and a valid driver's license.
- Have one year to dedicate
- Be available for 10 to 12 hours per month
- Have experience no significant life changes within the past year- loss of family or close friend; marriage; divorce; birth of child.
- Do not anticipate any major changes within the next year.
- No record of abuse/ harm to another individual
